

TURTLE CONSERVATION AND REHABILITATION ON THE ISLAND OF NUSA PENIDA IN BALI

Assist a Turtle Conservation project located on an island which is a 45 minute speed boat ride from mainland Bali.

The project is in its early stages and you'll contribute to collecting vital baseline data on the turtle population on Nusa Penida. Depending on the time of the year (turtles do not nest all year round), you may identify turtle species, collect eggs, monitor nests or see hatchlings get safely to sea.

During the day, you'll also teach English at one of the local schools on the island. Few native English speakers have taught English here before, so your experience is guaranteed to be an authentic one!

PROJECT OVERVIEW

WORK CONTENT:

The Sea Turtle is a *charismatic megafauna* and known for its appearance in the movie Finding Nemo, though 6 out of the 7 turtle species are still either critically endangered or on the IUCN Red list of 2013. The Turtle conservation project is based on the famous Island of **Nusa Penida** just off the coast of Bali.

May 23rd is World Turtle Day so why not take a break now and visit the amazing beaches of Bali and work at saving one the world's oldest creatures.

Your project starts with a 45 minute speed boat ride from Mainland Bali onto the beautiful unspoilt Island of Nusa

Penida. This untouched paradise is one of the last remaining Islands that Sea Turtles can access for breeding.

The project is still in the early stages of development, which makes your involvement highly beneficial in growing the awareness of this highly endangered species, which is estimated to have existed since the time of dinosaurs some 110 million years ago.

Most of conservation work with the turtles of Nusa Penida will be done in the late afternoons and evenings.

Your duties will vary depending on the time of year as turtles do not nest all year round, so flexibility is essential. During your placement your daily activities could include:

- Collecting data on the turtle population of Nusa Penida
- Identifying different turtle species there are 7 different types.
- Collecting eggs for research and monitoring nests
- Overseeing the safety of the hatchlings as they migrate to sea. (Hatchlings must pass through an obstacle course of predators in order to get safely to sea)

During the day you'll volunteer at one of the local schools in **Ubud**, the cultural centre of Bali. Children in Bali thirst for education though few have ever been taught by a native English speaker. This makes the experience highly authentic and rewarding for both you and the children.

You'll work as an assistant teacher and have the opportunity to teach whole classes of your own, too.

The main focus is to improve the students' English through fun and interactive methods like: Sports, singing, art, games and general knowledge quizzes. This helps developed confidence and thus an eagerness to attend school on a regular basis. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity to travel to the stunning Island of Bali and make an impact in both conservation and teaching!

SOME INFORMATION ON SEA TURTLES

A charismatic megafauna (Large animal species with widespread popular appeal) and the earth's most ancient creature dating back 110 million years with 7 different species recorded, it's no wonder this "hippie of the sea" has its own international awareness day - 23rd May.

Indonesia is one of the main breeding sights for 6 of the 7 sea turtles species: Green turtle, Hawksbill, Olive riley, Leatherback, Loggerhead and Fatback. The largest of all is the Leatherback which can reach over six and a half feet long (over 1.8m) and weigh over 2,000 pounds (over 907 kg). Unlike other turtles, sea turtles are unable to retract into their shells and only live for up to an age of 80.

Why are Sea Turtles endangered?

With only 1 in 1,000 baby sea turtles surviving to adulthood, this remarkable species has a low population indicator and is a front runner for extinction. Sea Turtles copy the breeding patterns of Salmon, returning to the same nesting ground year round, It is believed that the sea turtle builds an affinity for its nesting beach, thus the continued loss of breeding grounds has a serious impact.

However that is only the tip of the iceberg; Oil spills, habitat loss, pollution, the fishing industry, climate change, poaching for trade (pets and food) and artificial lighting from cities which disrupt the natural reflection of the ocean which turtles use to find their way all have a negative impact on their behaviour and nesting success.

On Arrival, your Introduction to the Country:

When you arrive you will be welcomed by a member of the team who will take you to your accommodation and introduce you to everyone.

REQUIREMENTS AND NOTES:

Indonesia is still a developing country thus the living standard falls short of what we are used to in the West. The Balinese culture and heritage is totally different to Anglo-Saxon or Western cultures. However, the people are very friendly and will help you all they can, and, of course, you will be well looked after during your placement!

Our projects in Bali are worthwhile and lots of fun, and you're sure to have a wonderful time during your stay - your adventure has begun :-)
